A Modest Proposal

Most people who live in Parkwood are likely aware, at least vaguely, that there is a creek running through Parkwood. Back yards of a few homes adjoin the creek, but most folks need to walk along a few of our trails or visit Sedwick Park for closeup views of the creek.

The creek's official name isn't impressive and not well-known: "Northeast Creek Tributary C". It crosses under five streets on its way through Parkwood, but there aren't any signs.

As waterbodies go the creek isn't large or long, and except after heavy rains (as seen above), not really very noticeable. It's just a quiet, pretty little thing trickling through the woods, getting a little bigger from runoff as it flows southward. It's mostly natural, meaning it's never been significantly "urbanized". It begins at the north edge of Parkwood, flows through the Old Growth forest area, past the old fire station, creates the Lotus Pond, and flows into Parkwood Lake before heading on south past three small communities into Corps of Engineers wetlands and Northeast Creek itself – then onward to Jordan Lake, the Cape Fear River, and the Atlantic Ocean.

Overall, the entirety of 'Tributary C' is just a little over 2 miles long, so it's not exactly a major geographical feature.

Of that total two-mile length, however, about 1.5 miles lies within the Parkwood community. About .94 miles is common land, owned by the Parkwood Association and Parkwood Villages, therefore open to everyone, with the rest government- or privately-owned and/or outside the boundaries of Parkwood. The creek's owners have preserved and cared for it, while adding considerably to its flow, since it drains a large part of Parkwood.

And now (*"finally!"* you're probably thinking) we come to the 'Modest Proposal':

This little creek should be renamed "Parkwood Creek." It's almost entirely within our community, we contribute water to it, clean it and maintain it, and have done so for over 60 years now. It's time to recognize it as an official part of Parkwood – indeed, you could call it the natural spine of Parkwood. And we should also note that while it was once an intermittent creek, growth has turned Parkwood Creek into much more of a constant-flow stream, not just a minor tributary.

(There's also a Tributary D, which drains Hunters Woods and a little bit of western Parkwood – the McCormick high land and along Wineberry. Eastern parts of Parkwood drain into Northeast Creek itself, but that's a story for another time.)

So how do you change the name of a geographic feature that's on all the maps and records? Done officially, it would be a very very slow process, probably involving all kinds of governmental decision-makers over many years. But we can start by calling it "Parkwood Creek" ourselves. It's our creek and we can call it what we want, right? Think of it as kind of a multi-New Year's Resolution. And hopefully, in time, we can move the process along until Parkwood Creek becomes the official (and well-deserved) name of our friendly little creek. So say hello to Parkwood Creek the next time you're nearby.

Dear Parkwood neighbors,

My name is Adam Benson, and I am the pastor at Parkwood United Methodist Church. At PUMC, we want to be more intentional about listening: listening for God, listening to each other, and listening to our neighbors. I am writing to inform and invite you to couple of these opportunities for us to listen to God and one another, and then we would like to hear from you on how you think our facilities and property could best be used for the good of the neighborhood.

Listening Circles: at PUMC, we've started new small groups called "Listening Circles," where 5-8 people get together, have dinner and play a game, called "My Neighbor's Voice," at least once per month. The card game "My Neighbor's Voice" is played by each person picking a card with a category on it, and that person has three minutes to answer the question or prompt on the card. The main rule is no cross-talk: the rest of the group must listen and no one can respond to someone's answer. After each person has answered a card, you debrief: how did you experience that session? What did you learn about your neighbors? It's a wonderful way to be intentional about how getting to know your neighbors and build bridges across topics where there are often divides. Lectio Divina: Starting on Wednesday, February 7 @ noon, we will start a hybrid (online and in-person) small group gathering where we will read scripture using an ancient practice called Lectio Divina, and the purpose of this kind of reading is to listen: both listen for how God or how the text is speaking into our lives, today. We will also have some time for visiting and getting to know one another, in-person and online. This time will be offered each Wednesday @ noon until March 20th, then we'll take a two-week break, and resume on Wednesday, April 10 @ noon. To join in-person, you may come to the church and there will be directions to the fellowship hall. To join online via Zoom, reach out to me, adam.benson@nccumc.org, for the Zoom details.

Disc Golf baskets are open for anyone in the community to use! If you have driven by Parkwood United Methodist Church, you may have noticed two blue disc golf baskets in the fields on either side of our building. These are available for the whole community to use, so please use them!

Also, if you would like to use our building or facilities for a meeting for your organization, please let us know. We offer our fellowship hall free-of-charge for HOA's and organizations to use for meetings. Our address is 5123 Revere Rd., we have a kitchen (with a gas stove), a fellowship hall that holds up to about 80 people, and while we have handicapped parking spaces near the building, we share a parking lot across the street with the JIAR Parkwood Masjid.

Lastly, at PUMC, we want to hear from you. If you have an idea or a suggestion on how we can best offer or utilize our facilities or property for the good of the neighborhood, we would like to hear from you! Parkwood's Newest Addition



Two years ago, the Parkland Planning Committee (the PPC) installed Parkwood's first-ever public dock on Parkwood Lake. The dock is located at 5613 Pelham Rd., the open space at the western end of the Dam, and like all our community spaces is open from dawn to dusk. With nearby benches and a picnic table, the dock has proved to be very popular not only for boating and fishing, but for picnics and nature watching.

Kayakers did comment, however, that the dock's elevation above the water made it a long step down into their boat, so a YakPort launch has now been added, to make getting in and out of the water easier and safer for beginners or experienced users. Kayaks, canoes or stand-up paddle boards with a width 34" and under can use the YAKport.

The manufacturer's website (www.yakport.com) has several videos showing how helpful it is to use the Yakport for launching and recovering a kayak or paddleboard.



If you have any comments about the dock and its new launch device, or would like to suggest other additions to outdoor life in Parkwood, please contact the PPC at possibilities@parkwoodnc.org.

The PPC is also anticipating that later this year, after several years of planning and preparation, work will begin on installing a 45-ft. long pedestrian bridge at the eastern end of the Dam, which will connect the two sections of the Sedwick Park trail. For kayak or canoe users, who now need to park along Pelham Rd. to unload or load their watercraft, the new bridge will allow easier access from the Sedwick Rd. parking lot along the gravel trail, across the bridge, and along the dam to the dock's location at the western end of the Parkwood Lake dam.

Finance Committee Report - M. Dean

January 8, 2024 Finance Committee Meeting

The Finance Committee of the PHA held their monthly virtual meeting on January 8, 2024 from 7:00 - 7:50. Attending were Marie Dean, Olga Rodriguez, Marsha Brooks, & Felipe Rodriguez.

The committee reviewed the December report from PPM. Of the 14 accounts that were voted last month, who had not paid their 2023 dues, there are 9 which PPM have escalated, with 1 having paid in full, 1 that they question whether we'd add to their 2024 balance, and 3 needing the PPM demand sent with their promise to monitor 3 weeks before sending onto our attorney if payment is not made.

Ganley's office reported as of January 1, 2024, their hourly rate for partner time will be standardized to \$300/hr. and their hourly rate for associate attorney time will be standardized to \$225/hr., as always, billed by tenths of an hour. Their flat fee collection fees are also increasing, due to the increase in work at the front-end of the collection process, and the reduced rate of foreclosures. They will no longer be sending a demand letter; but will rely on the HOA's 15 day demand letter, which in our case is sent by PPM, and follow up with a lien if directed to do so.

Parks, Lawns, and Ballfield Committee Meeting Minutes

Committee Members in Attendance: Bill Mitchell, Steven Berkowitz, Michael Brooks, Ray Dean, Rob Shoaf, Chris Classen, Mary Mertz

1. Grounds

- a. Rescue Lawn Care (RLC) (Bill Mitchell)

- i. The HOA and RLC have signed the contract.
- ii. RLC provided a quote to remove debris weekly from the forebay culvert on Clermont in 2024. Additional quotes needed. (In addition, Steven Berkowitz is in contact with Durham Streets Maintenance to address this problem).

2. Plantings

- a. Rescue Lawn Care (Chris Classen)
 - i. Chris sent RLC an email about replacement of dead pansies, but there has been no response. Bill says it is in our contract, but pansies may not be available. Chris will text Jay Hardy.

3. Waterbody and Drainage

- a. Dragonfly Pond Works Contract (Bill Mitchell)
 - i. The HOA and Dragonfly Pond Works have signed the contract. Will get an invoice after each visit. 6 visits per year starting in April.
- b. 8 Shelter Cove Sink Hole Project (Steven Berkowitz)
 - i. This is now scheduled (by Dragonfly Pond) for January 11, 2024.
 - ii. \$3,925 of 2023 funds will be used.

Update: Work has successfully been completed as of print of this newsletter.

- c. Emergency Spillway, Parkwood Lake (Steven Berkowitz)
 - i. Sediment has built up on the lake side of the spillway, eastern edge of the lake, which needs to be removed to enable the spillway capacity to not be diminished. Dragonfly Pond Works is to look at this and give us a bid to complete this task. There would need to be a location established to spread the removed materials (it should be good material amenable to grow grass). Work could possibly be scheduled in conjunction with the bridge installation project.
- d. Durham NCDOT
 - i. Road Ditch Maintenance, Sedwick Parking Lot. (Steven Berkowitz)

1. I have called Kyle Sanders, Durham DOT Maintenance, who we've worked with in the past, for an update when they plan to deal with this.
- e. City of Durham (Steven Berkowitz)
 - i. Clermont Culvert: I have a request in to Durham Streets Maintenance (through Durham One-Call) to address the short-term clean-out needs, and I also hope to get through to someone to discuss a possible longer-term solution to this problem. Its current problematic functionality is part due to a design/installation problem with the 42-inch culvert (replaced in 2014) which at least keeps the accumulated materials out of the lake and within the Forebay (previously referred to as the Lotus Pond, though lotuses have not returned after a dredging project done years ago). The "long-term" solution may therefore be just an agreement by the City to remove debris periodically as needed. (Bill Mitchell has received a quote from RLC to remove debris weekly from the Clermont forebay culvert in 2024).
4. Woods and Tree Maintenance
 - a. Donald Allen (Bill Mitchell)
 - i. Twenty-one task orders were issued and completed in 2023. \$15,250 of the allocated \$20,000 in the 2023 budget was spent.
 - ii. Bill presented 6 tree removal tasks.
 - iii. The Committee agrees to present the following Motions to the Board of Directors for approval.

Motion 1: To authorize Donald Allen to cut down and remove 4 dead or dying crepe myrtles and a dead wild cherry tree near the Euclid Pond for \$1,000 using account 50-05078-00.

Motion that the Board approve Motion 1 as set forth by the Parks and Lawns Committee. Seconded.

Motion passes.

Motion 2: To authorize Donald Allen to cut down and remove a dying double-trunk tree leaning over Parkwood Lake next to the bench at Pelham Road Cove for \$1,200 using account 50-05078-00.

Motion that the Board approve Motion 2 as set forth by the Parks and Lawns Committee. Seconded. Motion passes.

Motion 3: To authorize Donald Allen to cut down 3 dead trees threatening to fall on users of the Newhall to Revere Trail and 2 dead trees threatening to fall on structures at 5607 Newhall and 1407 Sedwick Road for \$1,200 using account 50-05078-00.

Motion that the Board approve Motion 3 as set forth by the Parks and Lawns Committee. Second. Motion passes.

Motion 4: To authorize Donald Allen to cut down three dead trees threatening to fall into the Tot Lot (\$150) and flatten the piles of cut up tree branches and logs lying behind the Tot Lot for appearance and safety (\$500) for a total of \$650 using account 50-05078-00.

Motion that the Board approve Motion 4 as set forth by the Parks and Lawns Committee. Seconded. Motion passes.

iv. Bill provided information about 2 additional projects.

1. Burbank Circle dead apple tree is not hazardous plus has fire ant hills that must be treated first before the tree can be removed.
2. Magnolia trees at Parkwood entrance and 3 dead trees nearby on the eastern side need atten-

tion but are not hazardous. Bill wants a couple more bids.

- b. Leaf and Limb Pilot Study to Identify Tree and Branch Hazards (Bill Mitchell)
 - i. A Leaf & Limb arborist surveyed the 1.8-acre test plot located at 4907 Revere Rd last month. The arborist plans to submit his report by mid-January identifying all hazardous and potentially hazardous trees and branches plus recommendations. 2023 funds of \$1,200 have been approved.
- 5. Ballfield (Bill Mitchell)
 - a. To prevent freeze damage, the ballfield backflow prevention valve (RPZ valve) was removed (by Bill) from the ballfield water line and moved to a heated, secure location where it will be kept until it is re-installed in late March. Bill is working with South Durham Little League (SDLL) for them to take care of this earlier in the fall. (Note that this valve is expensive).
 - b. The ballfield will be treated with the long-acting pesticide for controlling fire ants in late January or early February when the other common areas are treated. RLC will bill SDLL directly.
- 6. Trail Maintenance (no reports)
- 7. New Business
 - a. Request to discuss merging Playgrounds Committee back into this committee. (Ray Dean).
 - i. Discussion based on history. PLBF is currently maintaining the playgrounds. PPC focuses on new things, so new equipment and such for playgrounds could be planned through that committee.
 - ii. The Committee agrees to present the following Motion to the Board of Directors for approval.

Motion to split responsibilities of the Playground Committee into two other committees. The PLBF Committee will take care of maintenance of playgrounds, and future development of playgrounds

will go through PPC. Seconded. Motion passes.

- b. Opportunity for Durham Parks and Recreation to repurpose the old fire. department property for use by greater Parkwood Community. (Steven Berkowitz). Discussion based on a flyer sent out by Steven. Steven joined the meeting and suggested PPC get involved.
- c. Kayak launch is in place. Hope to include photos in the next newsletter. Bill or Mike will follow up with Laura.
- d. Rob Shoaf led discussion about Euclid Park thicket, Crape Myrtles and heap of mulch left. Bill will follow up with RLC and Donald Allen, and we will discuss this further at the next meeting.

Native Seed Starting Workshop a Success!

On January 6th fifteen people braved the rain to attend the second native seed starting workshop funded through the B. W. Wells Stewardship fund of the North Carolina Native Plant Society.

All attendees were given the necessary soil and knowledge to select the right seeds for their yard's growing environments. The nearly 40 plant varieties included Echinacea, Columbine, Butterfly Weed, Coreopsis, Penstemons, Lobelias, Bee Balms, Golden Rods and more. Information slides were updated to include the number of caterpillars hosted by each of the plants' genus, and share additional landscape benefits. It was fun to discuss the simplicity of winter sowing with such a great group of enthusiastic gardeners.

This was the third event of our native plant project, a collaboration between myself and the Parks and Lawns Committee of the HOA. Neighbors planted 70+ native flowers and grasses at Custer Circle in early November 2023, and over 30 people attended a native seed workshop in early December. We are hoping that because of these events, neighbors will continue to explore native plants for their landscaping needs. Winter sowing is a cost effective and low-barrier-to-entry approach to growing plants for your home landscape. If you haven't already, please look at all the curated resources that were created and compiled for these events.

Look out for a plant giveaway event this Spring where we celebrate seed germination and take time to replot our budding seedlings.
