# Governor issues executive order to protect and restore North Carolina's natural resources

Governor Roy Cooper, on Feb. 12, issued Executive Order 305, which increases wetland and forest conservation efforts and provides better flood protection issues. Among other things, the order sets statewide goals to permanently conserve one million new acres of forests and wetlands, restore or reforest one million more acres of wetlands and forests, and plant 1 million new trees in urban areas by 2040. Don't you love it when someone thinks in round numbers?

EO 305 also extends a Native Plant Policy for state government, requiring the use of native plants at all state parks, historic sites, and roadways, including landscaping for all future state-owned projects. It also directs the state to avoid or minimize new projects that would adversely impact rare and vulnerable wetlands like pocosins<sup>1</sup>, Carolina Bays<sup>2</sup>, and mountain bogs<sup>3</sup>.

Along with many environmental groups, Sara Ward with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service called it *"a game-changing target to conserve and restore millions of acres while addressing climate hazards and nature equity in urban areas."*

The Governor called the order *"the most significant executive action to protect the state's ecosystems since Governor Jim Hunt launched the 'Million Acre Initiative' in 1999."* That goal was achieved (10 years late) at the end of 2020.

This saga, however, really begins in northern Idaho more than 16 years ago with a lawsuit against the EPA, eventually resulting in a US Supreme Court decision in May, 2023 (21-454 Sackett v. EPA), which with a 5-4 majority said that a wetlands can't be protected (and thus be part of the "waters of the United States" or WOTUS) unless it has a "continuous surface connection" to other – generally downstream – protected waters.

The Supreme Court's minority opinion held that if polluting or destroying a certain wetland affected the health of a second body of water that's already protected (but has no surface connection), then both deserve the same level of protection. But the majority decision rules: underground (invisible) seepage means no protection, which could allow development of any wetlands without a surface connection. The EPA's long-standing Clean Water Act was largely destroyed. Developers were pleased.

North Carolina legislators promptly jumped on the bandwagon. Wording was quickly tucked into North Carolina's 2023 Farm Act, which covered more than 30 topics touching on everything from upping the penalty for animal waste spilled along state roads, padding buffers by trout streams, to mandating muscadine grape juice in all public K-12 schools. Added was a new codicil that locked in how, Supreme Court-style, the state must re-define and protect wetlands (or not).

That provision prompted Gov. Cooper to veto the Farm Bill when it arrived on his desk last summer, but the legislative Super Majority quickly overrode his veto. The North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality estimated that more than half of the state's wetlands – as much as 2.5 million acres – could lose protection.

But now we have Gov. Cooper's ambitious new initiative: to conserve and restore wetlands that lost their state (and federal) protections last year, all because of that Idaho lawsuit. As Cooper stated in a release, *"As our state continues to grow, we must be mindful to conserve and protect our natural resources, and this historic Executive Order sets clear goals and puts a plan in place that will help us leave our state better than we found it for generations to come."* Thanks, Roy!

2. PPM Issues.
  - a. Review of the PPM Contract. The cash report is due to be received next week. We will check to see if PPM fees are broken down and included on this report.
  - b. Request from Playground Committee to look into Issues with PPM/VIVE to get Precise Paving approved and paid. Marie will draft a letter from HOA President to Precise Paving to request proof of Liability Insurance.
  - c. Reschedule meeting with PPM that was postponed by PPM from November. We will wait until April to attempt to arrange for another meeting with PPM.
3. Maintenance for Office/Community Center.
  - a. Laura received an email from a company called ACR. We will look into seeing if they would like to submit a bid.

The Finance Committee of the PHA held their monthly virtual meeting on February 7, 2024 from 7:00 - 7:25. Attending were Marie Dean, Marsha Brooks, & Felipe Rodriguez.

The committee reviewed the January report from PPM. As of Feb 6, we did not have any homeowners that are ready for the collections attorney. However, three accounts have received the FINAL Late Notice. The vendor invoice report was reported for 01/01/2023 - 01/31/2023 instead of the 2024 period, but

PPM was contacted and Claudia Mellette promised to post for our accessibility the corrected period.

Ganley's office reported (1) account in foreclosure on hold, and of the 6 accounts we sent them in January that they'd filed a claim of lien, 2 had paid in full. Cost to file the liens total \$1912.77.

## **Parks and Lawns - M. Mertz**

Attendance: Bill Mitchell, Steven Berkowitz, Michael Brooks, Ray Dean, Rob Shoaf, Chris Classen, Mary Mertz, Marie Dean, Andrew Hunter

1. Grounds
  - a. Clermont Forebay Culvert (Bill Mitchell and Steven Berkowitz)
    - i. Bill has asked for another quote from RLC to remove debris every 2 weeks.
    - ii. Steven reports that Durham Streets Maintenance declares only the culvert itself is their responsibility so an extensive discussion addressed long term planning including to put a grate system there like the one below the lake dam to prevent blockage. Steven will work with Bill to coordinate with Dragonfly, also asking about an additional grate. If debris could be regularly removed, it could prevent the need for extensive dredging.
  - b. Rescue Lawn Care (Bill Mitchell)  
Bill reviewed the 4 categories of RLC projects, such as, mowing and bush hogging and how often. Bill has requested a schedule from RLC.
2. Plantings (Chris Classen)  
RLC has replanted the pansies per Jay Hardy.
3. Waterbody and Drainage
  - a. Shelter Cove Sink Hole Project (Steven Berkowitz)  
Steven reports this work has been completed by Dragonfly Pond Works, inspected by him, and payment has been approved using 2023 funds. ( Effected homeowner was quite satisfied with work completed. Steven alerted workers where to avoid cutting Internet lines.)
  - b. Emergency Spillway, Parkwood Lake (Steven Berkowitz)  
Sediment has built up on the lake side of the spillway, eastern edge of the lake, which needs to be removed. Steven has received a bid from Dragonfly Pond Works and is reaching out for other bids.

This led to discussion of new fence by homeowner on Parkwood land according to our map/survey, especially since this land may be needed for Parkwood Lake maintenance. (Parkwood Bylaws require homeowners to request permission from the Board for projects on park land.)

MOTION for the Board:

The Parks, Lawn, and Ballfield Committee turns this matter over to the Board. We request a letter be sent to the homeowners from the President requesting the wooden fence and the wire fence be moved on or within the homeowner's property line.

- c. Sedwick Parking Lot (Steven Berkowitz). Steven continues communicating with NCDOT for road ditch maintenance. For now, Steven cleared the drain. He estimated it took him 45 minutes, and he moved 8 wheelbarrows of debris.

While on the topic, it was noted that the Sedwick Parking Lot entrance needs repair again. Ray Dean repaired it before. Additional work is needed, including substituting concrete parking blocks for the plastic blocks next to the entrance ways.

#### 4. Woods and Tree Maintenance

- a. Donald Allen, RLC, Miscellaneous (Bill Mitchell)
  - i. All projects approved by the Board in January for Donald Allen have been completed. Bill reports that \$4,425 has been spent so far on trees.
  - ii. There is a tree reported for possible hazard that Donald Allen plans to examine soon.
  - iii. A homeowner reached out to Laura with a question in regards to maintenance of the small strip of parkland on Sinnott Circle. Bill confirms this area is included in RLC contract for 2024, and RLC should provide a schedule for this work soon.

- iv. The heap of mulch dumped on Travis Circle needs attention.
- v. (Homeowners and vendors are reminded not to dump on Parkwood land.)

- b. Leaf and Limb Pilot Study report has been submitted to Bill Mitchell and shared with all Board members. During the study, Leaf and Limb marked a post oak tree with tape that has a couple of smaller dead limbs that hang over the back fence of a home to the left of 4909 Revere Road. Donald Allen and Bill determine the limbs do not need attention at this time. No trees were recommended for removal. In the report, Leaf and Limb advised ivy and vines be cut at the base of trees.
- c. Topic for discussion: How does a Parkwood resident request permission to cut ivy and vines on parkland near their property line according to our tree policy?

After discussion, the committee agreed to ask Laura to post the "Permission to Remove Invasive Plants" form on the Parkwood website. Homeowners can also obtain the form from the Parkwood HOA office. Forms should be completed and returned to the office. Then the Parkwood Manager will alert the Parks, Lawns, and Ball Field Committee for a representative to meet with the homeowner on site to review the homeowner's plan before permission is granted.

#### 5. Ball Field (Bill Mitchell)

Bill reported that the ball field received treatment for fire ants on January 31, 2024. (RLC will treat other parklands for ant control this month).

Bill also shared he has been in discussions to have RLC bill South Durham Little League (SDLL) directly for fire ant treatment. SDLL is fine with that arrangement. RLC will get back to Bill.

#### 6. Trail Maintenance (Steven Berkowitz)

A Trail Maintenance Report was submitted February 5, 2024 by Daniel Maxwell with Silent Treatment. Daniel reported to Steven that a tree had fallen on the Revere to Newhall trail blocking the trail. The agreement is for Silent Treatment to remove small trees off the trails. Steven and Bill will coordinate to determine the size of the tree and if Daniel or Donald Allen needs to follow up.

of a Boy Scout Troop or other organization adopting this as a project. Tetherballs. Due to regular use, the tetherballs at Sedwick Park and Hidden Park need replacing regularly. Ray Dean agreed to continue replacements. The committee encouraged Ray to purchase 4 or more balls at a time to simplify this work. According to Ray, the Sedwick Park ball needs replacing about every other month, and the Hidden Park ball needs replacing about every three months. (For the record, Ray plans to purchase 4 Baden School Quality Tetherball Sets with soft-touch ball and rope from the regular vendor for \$82.56 including tax to be reimbursed from GL Code 00553.)

- 7. Playground Maintenance  
The Executive Committee is working with PPM and Precise Paving to ensure they have adequate insurance coverage as a vendor to perform the task of replacing the basketball court at Sedwick Park.

A homeowner has requested a picnic table at Emerald Pond at the end of Clermont, adjacent to parking lot with swimming pool. There is currently a metal bench near the pond and some concrete seats up on the side. We support upgrades to Emerald Pond. Discussion included the possibility
