Notes from the Parkwood Community Garden

10 things you might not know about the Community Garden:

1. **Where is it?** We're located at 1417 Seaton Road, between the Parkwood HOA building and the old fire station, alongside one of our many beautiful Parkwood trails.
2. **When are garden volunteers there?** Someone is usually there at 9 or 10 am on Sunday mornings. This depends on weather, so if the weather is better on Saturday, you might find us there on Saturday instead – or possibly on both days, if we can't stay away. The calendar on the last page of this newsletter has our regular hours.
3. **Do I need gardening experience to participate?** No, if you're new to gardening, feel free to stop by whenever a garden volunteer is there. If you already know what you're doing and you want to stop by briefly to help pull some weeds, etc., we keep a notebook inside the signboard to the right of the gate. Just check in there to see if there is a "to do" list. This time of year we don't have the irrigation system turned on yet, so the "to do" is usually watering the young 'uns! Please be sure to always close the gate when you leave.
4. **If I feel like helping out occasionally, is there any commitment?** Absolutely not! While we hope you find the time to come back, everyone is welcome to visit and lend a hand whenever they feel like it, even if it's only once. We have gloves to lend and tools to share during hours when the regular volunteers are there.
5. **I see some of the beds have people's names on them. What does that mean?** Those beds are maintained by members of our community and the fruits or veggies growing there are theirs to harvest. Please respect their hard work, and harvest only from the beds that aren't assigned to someone. (They have a hard enough time competing with the squirrels!) Feel free to email us to be assigned a bed of your own when one is available.
6. **Can anyone stop by and pick something?** Yes. We have only a very small number of regular volunteers so we hope that those of you who harvest will also lend a hand, but it's not obligatory. If you do pick, keep in mind that these fruits & veg are here for everyone, so please harvest only enough for yourself, and don't pull out entire plants. If you or someone you know needs plants for your own garden but can't afford them, please email us and we'll do our best to help out. Every Spring we try to divide our herbs and perennials, pot those up, and give those away, too. There are scissors at the garden to use for snipping herbs, etc. A cautionary note about scissors that doesn't involve running: it's super important that you're careful not to cut the irrigation lines- they are black or brown, and are sometimes well camouflaged beneath foliage. If you do, (yes, it happens) please call the HOA office immediately at (919) 544-2161 so we can repair it ASAP. Otherwise, the garden and parking lot can flood (it also happens.)
7. **Can I follow the garden progress online?** Yes, follow us on Instagram #parkwoodcg Keep an eye out there for our plant giveaways!
8. **What's that small garden outside the fence?** We have a rain garden along the west fence of the community garden. The garden is on a small slope, and all that water needs to go somewhere, so we channel it into this rain garden instead of the parking lot. It's a good example of something you can easily install at home to divert and use excess runoff. We grow some elderberry, hibiscus, irises, and other plants who prefer wet feet. Along the front fence we have herbs growing in the barrels and planters, and some flowers. Many of the spring flowering bulbs you see there and around Parkwood were donated by Keep Durham Beautiful and planted by our volunteers.
9. **What's all that stuff growing next to the community center? Is that also part of the community garden?** Sort of...it's a pollinator garden that we planted in 2017 with donated plants, compost, and mulch from Keep Durham Beautiful. Our community garden volunteers also maintain the plants in this bed. We sometimes add to it, and sometimes divide and give away plants from there, a lot of which are native pollinators. This garden is not on the irrigation system, so it's survival of the fittest! Feel free to stop by and see which plants will grow well here, and what type of pollinators they can bring to your garden.
10. **Your plants look great! (Why, thank you!) What are you using for compost?** All compost is donated by Compostnow. We are one of their community garden partners, which means we receive donated compost from them, courtesy of their customers. We just have to pay for delivery. For more information, visit compostnow.org.

March 7, 2024 Finance Committee Meeting

The Finance Committee of the PHA held their monthly virtual meeting on March 7, 2024 from 7:00 - 7:35. Attending were Marie Dean, & Felipe Rodriguez.

The committee reviewed the February report from PPM. As of March 6, PPM reports we have 4 homeowners who have been sent a demand email but none that are ready to be sent to the attorney.

There were no updates from Ganley's office to report because the foreclosure resolution on the accounts we'd sent from last month were just completed and returned by mail on March 4, so they had not yet been received.

Motion: To go into executive session to discuss/vote on homeowner financial matters.

1. Grounds

Mulch. Bill Mitchell

RLC wants to spread 160 cu ft of landscape mulch specified in the contract on plantings throughout Parkwood between March 15 and March 31.

The labor cost to spread the mulch is included in the RLC contract but the cost of the mulch is not. In previous years, the HOA would pay the driver for the mulch with a check made out to the mulch supplier (PalletOne). But because of problems getting the check issued by PPM promptly, the 2024 contract was amended to have the Board approve the purchase of the mulch and have RLC pay for the mulch and then bill the HOA for the cost.

So, RLC plans to order the mulch and pay for it on delivery and then bill the HOA for the cost which Jay estimates will be between \$5,400 and \$5,500.

MOTION: To authorize RLC to purchase 160 cubic yards of landscape mulch for plantings at a cost not to exceed \$5,500 using GL Code 00531. Seconded. Motion passes.

Treating the Common Areas for Fire Ants.

Bill Mitchell

RLC plans to treat Parkwood common areas between now and March 15.

Mowing Schedule. Bill Mitchell

RLC started mowing a few of the common areas last week because the grass was a little high. (The contract states they will start mowing common areas on March 1.) This week RLC will begin mowing all the areas that are to be mowed weekly and next week they will expand the mowing to include the areas that are to be mowed every two weeks. They also plan to brush-hog the

areas designated to be brush-hogged semi-annually within the next two weeks.

Tree Removal. Bill Mitchell

Donald Allen cut down three dead trees (cost \$700) on the Newhall to Revere Trail the homeowner at 120 Temple Lane was concerned might fall on his house and two other trees (cost \$250) that Bill noticed further up on the trail that needed to be removed for trail safety. Total cost: \$950.

Donald and Bill later walked the north leg section of the Newhall to Revere trail that runs behind the houses at 106 through 132 Larkspur Circle and found 29 dead and dying trees that pose a hazard to either people on the trail or homeowner properties. Ten of those trees posed an imminent and/or severe threat to structures on homeowner properties or to trail users which Donald could remove for \$1,000. So Bill authorized Donald to cut them down and hold off on the others until committee and Board approval. Donald has agreed to cut down the remaining 19 hazardous trees for \$1,400.

MOTION: To authorize Donald Allen to cut down 19 trees behind the houses on 106-132 Larkspur Circle that pose a threat to either users of the Newhall to Revere trail or structures and people on homeowner properties for \$1,400 to be paid from GL Code 50-05078. Seconded. Motion passes.

2. Emergency Spillway, Parkwood Lake. Steven Berkowitz

Sediment has built up on the lake side of the spillway, eastern edge of the lake which needs to be removed. Steven has received a bid from Dragonfly Pond Works and a second bid is in the works. Steven recently removed debris from the grate to promote drainage.

3. Invasive Plants. Bill Mitchell

Bill is revising forms, Permission for homeowners to remove invasive plants on Parkwood Association common areas and

Indemnity, Release, and Hold Harmless Agreement to include guidance for homeowners pertaining to a variety of invasive plant species.

4. Ballfield. Bill Mitchell and Steven Berkowitz Bill has been in touch with South Durham Little League (SDLL) about requested improvements. Accordingly, their contractor reports no permit is required. Bill will be in further contact with SDLL for updates before the Board votes to approve the improvements at the next Board meeting. Bill will confirm if their contractor is adequately insured.

Chris reminded the committee that SDLL has offered Parkwood their current bleachers when they are replaced and suggested we move them to Sedwick Park. Steven does not think that is a good idea because activities are going well there without bleachers.

Motion to approve the SDLL plan for improvements to the Parkwood Ballfield as described below:

1. **3rd base spectator area improvement: Remove 4' soil, add 46'x8' concrete slab and shed water toward the parking area. Area under the bleachers excavated, edged, lined and filled with gravel**
2. **Existing 3rd base bleachers replaced with 1 new set. Would you like us to dispose of the current sets or would you like to use them elsewhere?**
3. **10'x5' concrete pad behind home plate to permanently attach the scorer's table.**

This approval is contingent upon receipt by the Executive Committee a) a letter from the Mosque stating they have no objection to the plan and b) a letter from SDLL agreeing to indemnify and hold harmless the association from any cost or damages arising from water drainage onto the mosque property that results from the improvements in the plan.

Upon receipt of items a and b the Executive Committee is authorized to issue a letter to SDLL memorializing the Board's approval of the plan. Seconded. Motion passes.

4. Trail Maintenance. Steven Berkowitz Steven reported earlier that the bridge along the Lotus Pond to Ballfield trail has "shifted," according to Daniel Maxwell with Silent Treatment. Mike showed a current photo of the bridge. Committee members agreed the bridge needs work and suggested it would make a good volunteer project.
5. Parks and Playgrounds Sedwick Parking Lot. A pothole needs attention and a couple parking blocks need replacing at Sedwick Parking Lot. Mike reminded the committee there are two extra hollow barriers stored behind his house. It was suggested that when volunteers pour concrete to fill the pothole, they also fill the barriers with concrete to make them more substantial. Steven is researching to recommend an appropriate mixture for the project.

Update: Four donated railroad ties were installed by Committee volunteers on both sides of the two Parking Lot entrances, replacing broken plastic barriers.

Basketball Court Pavement.

Ray reported that he has taken down the basketball rim to prepare for a work crew. Marie shared that Precise Paving will start work soon, weather pending, to remove old concrete and to pour a new surface. Ray is in direct contact with Precise Paving and assured the committee that Precise Paving will cordon off the area until the project is complete.

Update: New concrete surface was installed March 21-22.

Picnic Table for Emerald Pond.

Steven and Mike presented various choices for a picnic table. The committee agreed on

a model that looks like a picnic table at Euclid Park that works well.

MOTION: To authorize the purchase of a picnic table kit and lumber for a total cost not to exceed \$500 using landscaping Code 00458. Seconded. Motion passes.

P&L Meeting was adjourned at 8:26 pm
Minutes submitted by Mary Mertz.

Motion to extend the Board meeting. Second. Motion passes.

Garden Committee - C. Classen

The Community Garden is underway for the Spring season. Beds are being prepared and planted. So far we have peas, rapini, cabbage, carrots, swiss chard, chives, cilantro, collards, and various herbs.

We have 5 people this year, who are working in their own beds. The garden group preps the

beds for the new gardeners. They choose what they want to plant. We provide some seeds and guidance if needed.

We are in the process of cleaning up the pollinator Garden. There are white iris, daffodils and other bulbs blooming. The volunteer hours for February were 39 1/2.

1. Approval of January minutes: minutes approved as written.
2. Sedwick Park Bridge Updates:
 - a. Permitting progress: Site Plan was approved by Durham City/County Planning Department February 19.
 - b. Next Steps: At next Board meeting, we hope to present updated bridge kit costs for approval and contract for signing. Contractors for building the bridge abutments and trail connections are now being sought.
3. New Parkwood entry signage
Revised PVC designs, locations, and price quotes discussed; next step is to apply for sign permits for 2 locations, and once permits are approved, present total costs to Board for approval.
4. Old Growth Trail Interpretive Signage project:
Draft of flyer and of survey received from Katie Zimmerman. Committee discussed & agreed with her suggestion to fund 3 Amazon gift cards in the amounts of \$50, \$25, and \$25 as an incentive for people to participate in the survey. Several modifications to the survey were also suggested, and the flyer, containing a link to the on-line survey, will be included in an upcoming Parkwood Press. Pete will follow up with Katie on these questions.
5. NEW BUSINESS:
 - a. Playgrounds: Board has approved the replacement of the Sedwick Park basketball court, with all new concrete, which will be done about the second week of March. A new basketball rim and net will also be installed.
 - b. Steven presented a grant prospect from

the NC DEQ, the 319 Grant Program (which is actually an annual program), for water quality restoration proposals. The due date is May 6; Steven will get more information for discussion at the next meeting.

6. Next meeting: Tuesday, March 19, 7pm via Zoom.

Parkwood Native Seed Planting Spring Update By Parkwood Resident Jeff Hawkinson

I am so grateful for Winter after Summer and Fall vegetables have been harvested, and the leafy greens have paused their growth during our coldest months. There may not be much happening



in the garden that we can see, but there's the reflection that comes with all you were able to observe over the last year. These past couple of years I've used winter as a time to focus on growing plants from seed that are native to our Piedmont ecoregion. I've had enough success to balance out the failure, and have added asters, milkweeds, bee balms, columbine, phlox, echinacea, penstemons, and others to our yard. It's been fun discussing different blooms with neighbors and observing the wildlife that've come to enjoy them.

Since November of last year Parkwood Parks and Lawns and I have hosted two native seed planting workshops, installed over 70 native plants and grasses at Custer Circle, and created a resource guide for anyone interested in learning more about landscaping with native plants. This project was funded through a grant from the NC Native Plant Society. Pictured here is a fraction of the seeds that I started over the winter using both the outdoor sowing method and the refrigerator method. Many of these plants will make their way into Custer Circle's Garden, but we hope also to distribute some of them to neighbors who might be interested in finding a home for them in their yard.
