*From the Parks, Lawns and
Ballfield Committee*

One of the great enjoyments provided by Parkwood's parks, lakes and ponds is the opportunity to observe wildlife in nature. Although it provides closer engagement with our furry and feathered neighbors, feeding them instead of allowing them to forage for their own food creates unnatural changes to their diet and nutrition. In the case of our migrating waterfowl, well-meaning residents who feed them

can actually be disruptive to their eating habits and detrimental to their health.

According to The Wildlife Center of Virginia, "What many people don't realize is that bread, rolls, chips, and other 'snack food' items do not offer the proper nutrition that ducks and geese need — and that the act of feeding a diet heavy in bread and other empty carbohydrates can lead to severe health consequences and a variety of other problems... One more problem with bread products is that this type of food expands in water — and the stomach — which gives ducks and geese an artificial feeling that they are full. As a result, these birds may not feel motivated to continue foraging on natural foods of higher nutritional value... But the bottom line is that wild ducks and geese should be able to find plenty of food on their own, so if you can resist the temptation to feed, simply pack your binoculars and camera and enjoy watching the birds."

An excellent article on the WCV website (<https://wildlifecenter.org>) entitled "The Problem with Feeding Ducks — No Crackers for Quackers" delves deeper into the unintended consequences of feeding these migratory birds, including growth deformities such as Metabolic Bone Disease (MBD) and "angel wing," a bone deformity that renders geese flightless for life.

The Mallard duck and Canada goose, in Parkwood's case, are our most visible migratory visitors. The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission informs us that "Mallards feed primarily on natural foods such as wild rice, pond weed, smartweed, bulrushes, and a number of other emergent and submerged plants. Geese readily consume food handouts such as bread or crackers, but these 'junk foods' provide little nutritional value. A goose's natural diet consists mostly of green vegetation such as grass. Avoid providing any food to geese as this can lead to overcrowding, pollution and disease, among other issues." Furthermore, the NCWRC allows that "While extra food may appear to be a good thing, it may lead to an expanded waterfowl population beyond the carrying capacity of the habitat... Wild animals who normally migrate may stay put due to the present food supply, which leads to exposure to elements, lack of food, and possible starvation during the winter."

So please let our waterfowl find their own food by following their natural instincts, while we enjoy their beauty and company during their migratory journeys through Parkwood!

Emergency situations (ie, trees threatening property) can be sent directly to the volunteers who would normally respond. The EC and Directors of the district involved will be cc'd.
3. **Maintenance at Office/Community Center.** We still have not received a response from Gerding Construction. Marie will contact the other contractor. we received a bid from and ask them to update their appraisal.
4. **Filing Corporate Transparency Act documentation.** Courts are still hearing cases for exempting HOAs from having to file. We will wait until the first of December to file. George will contact PPM to get costs for annual and interim change filings. Vickie will contact our attorney for the same information and ask about our Admin being able to file the change filings for us.

Finance Committee Report - G. Greene

Finance Committee Meeting

Meeting Date: November 13, 2024

Members in attendance: Greene, M. Dean, F. Rodriguez, M. Brooks

Meeting called to order: 7:05 pm.

1. Summation of Activities since last meeting.
 - a. We deposited the check from the City of Durham (\$2620) for reimbursement of the PALSCO legal fees.
 - b. Received 2 invoices (# 241256 – 241257) from Bagwell Holt and Smith for \$108.69 each (\$217.38).
 - c. We passed the invoice from NB&T (taxing filing) of \$1621.50 along to PPM for payment. The board had approved a payment not to exceed \$2150 in January 2024.
 - d. We declined participating in the voluntary IRS tax burden survey.
 - e. PPM communications:
 - i. George Greene communicated with Mikkie Pickle of PPM to switch the loan payment recording to new GL code (GL -05389) in the operating accounts section, to fix inappropriate accounting practice.
 - ii. George Greene has notified PPM that the association will deliver ratified budget after November Board Meeting.
 - iii. George Greene has scheduled a meeting with Claire of PPM to review accounts and practices for later in November.
 - iv. George Greene has reached out to Jennifer Ports of PPM to determine CTA filing costs. Jennifer Ports replied that the annual fee is \$500 but if the board does not change then an annual filing is not needed. If changes occurring during the year, it's a \$50 amendment. \$10000 non-compliance / late penalty. We must file this in December 2024.
2. Review October financial reports.
 - a. The financial report from PPM has been delivered to committee members.
 - b. Review the accounts receivable to recommend collections escalation.
3. Review and discuss 2025 budget request.
 - a. Preliminary draft budget and budget justification has been shared with committee

members.

4. Monthly meeting invitation to be sent the Monday of the week of the meeting.

Motions:

1. Motion to proceed with an escalation letter for assessment fees for one account. Motion Passed.
2. Motion to abandon the process of transferring the reserve account to a new bank. Motion Passed.

Motion to abandon the process of transferring the reserve account to a new bank. Seconded. Motion passes.

Meeting adjourned: 7:48 pm

Motion to approve the 2025 Budget as \$276,650. Assessment for 2025 will be \$275. Seconded. Motion passes.

Parks and Lawns - S. Berkowitz

Parks, Lawns, Ballfield and Playgrounds Committee Meeting - November 4, 2024: 7:05 -8:45 pm

In attendance: Steven Berkowitz (chair for November), Wray Dean, Marie Dean, Chris Classen, Rob Shoaf, George Green, Andrew Hunter and Liz Scisco

1. Grounds Contract: Current contract with RLC runs through 2025. Liz Scisco is planning to visit areas depicted in the 2024-2025 Grounds Contract, Exhibit B, over the next few weeks to confirm performance of specified tasks (e.g., areas to be bush hogged semi-annually; designated drainage features to be routinely cleared of sticks, debris and grass). Other committee members are also encouraged to monitor the specified areas and any adjustments/modifications needed to contracted 2025 services brought up for discussion at December's Committee meeting to bring to the Board.

The Grounds Contract will be up for renewal and possibly for re-bidding prior to 2026

2. Lake Contract: The last of the 6 monthly visits (Emerald Pond, Euclid Pond, Lotus Pond and Parkwood Lake, April through September) was completed by our contractor, Dragonfly Pond Works. Contract renews annually unless either party (Parkwood or Dragonfly) cancels upon 60-

days written notice, subject to an increase of 4% for each successive year. Dragonfly's proposed rate increase for 2025 should be confirmed. The need for dredging of the Lotus Pond was also discussed as again soon needed (last done in February 2023), but this work needs to be coordinated with the City of Durham's plans and schedule for modifying the Clermont Road culvert.

3. Tree Report: No new tree removal/maintenance needs for this month to date have been identified.
4. Plantings: Current Plantings contract with RLC runs through 2025.

Jeff Hawkinson provided a draft of his final report to be submitted to the NC Native Plant Society for the B.W. Wells Grant that supported the successful Parkwood Neighborhood Native Plant Garden (installed in Custer Circle) and associated Seed Planting Workshops. Jeff also presented to the Committee and Board a proposal for a follow-up native planting project for Winter 2024/25 through Fall 2025, to promote residents incorporating native plants into their personal landscapes or designated community areas.

Motion to approve Jeff Hawkinson's three-stage proposal to purchase native plant seeds, hold two seed-starting workshops and engage with Parkwood residents to propagate, care for, and make available established plants for distribution to homeowners and for community plantings areas by the Fall, 2025, at a cost of up to \$600, to be paid for from GL-00458. Seconded.

Motion to table this motion until budget approval. Seconded. Motion to table passes. Motion Tabled.

Chris reported on preliminary ideas for plantings to be established in an area along Good-year Circle next to Revere Road. Chris and Rob will meet to discuss further, and reach out to Jay Hardy, RLC, to suggest plant preferences and their maintenance needs, and come to the December Committee meeting with a specific proposal. Any needed modifications to the Plantings contract for 2025 will also be further reviewed to be brought forward to the Board

for approval.

5. Ballfield. Upon our request, South Durham Little League (SDLL) proposed language for modification to the lease agreement between Parkwood Association and SDLL (current lease effective January 18, 2021) was discussed, leading to the following motion:

Motion No. 2: The Committee approved taking to the Board for approval the following changes to Items 16 and 20 of the Parkwood Association/SDLL Ballfield Lease, to be effective January 1, 2025:

16. SDLL shall pay the Duke Energy bill for electric power at the Field and place the account in its name. SDLL shall also pay the monthly water bill and pay for the annual certification of the RPZ (backflow prevention) valve. Such utility payments shall be deemed to be a portion of the rent owed by SDLL to the Association under this lease. SDLL shall also be responsible for any repair or replacement of the backflow prevention valve or other components of the water service determined to be needed to maintain the water service. SDLL shall not be obligated to pay the water bill or property taxes with respect to the Field.

20. SDLL hereby guarantees a minimum annual payment of ~~\$750.00~~ \$125.00 to the Association with respect to Outside Revenue, in the event that the Association's share of actual Outside Revenue collected is less than that amount.

Motion to approve the changes to Items 16 and 20 of the Parkwood Association/SDLL Ballfield Lease, to be effective January 1, 2025. Seconded. Motion passes.

6. Clermont Culvert: Steven has had extensive discussions with Greg Smith, Engineering Manager, City of Durham Stormwater Division about performance concerns attributed to the 42-inch culvert under Clermont Road between the Lotus Pond and Parkwood Lake during significant rainfall events. The City contracted for an inspection of the pipe interior and found no evidence of any blockage. Steven provided a draft hydrologic/hydraulic analysis which shows that overtopping of Clermont Road during storms such as occurred September 27, 2024, and will re-occur during projected future storms even if debris is no longer allowed to accumulate at the culvert entrance, until significant modifica-



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tions to the culvert design are made. The City appears to now agree with this assessment and is in the process of securing a professional services contract with a consulting engineering firm whose work would include analysis of improvement options. They have relayed that "this is not an overnight process but is in the works" and that we'll be kept "posted along the way."

Parkwood executed an addendum to the Grounds contract with RLC for an initial clean-out in September and subsequent bi-weekly debris removal from the culvert inlet through December 31. The need to continue this work in 2025 will be assessed and recommendations presented to the Board.

7. Other Drainage Projects: Guins is scheduled to complete the 15-inch drainage pipe replacement project (in Common Area between Jennings Lane and Euclid Road) before Thanksgiving.

We discussed the need to develop a routine surveillance program for drainage structures and ditches Parkwood is responsible for maintaining, including those within common areas not included under our Grounds Contract.

8. Playgrounds. Wray is proceeding to complete equipment repairs in the Hidden Park (and Sedwick Park). The need for an asset inventory of playground equipment was discussed.
9. Trails. The bridge replacement along the Lotus Pond to Ballfield Trail was successfully completed in two days, thanks to the good work of a cadre of volunteers and our skilled contractor, Tom Konsler.
10. Old Business.
 - a. Invasive plants revised policy, indemnity form, and guidelines need to be finalized. Liz agreed to work on this, for presentation to the Board for final approval.
 - b. Fill has been Board-approved to be added to Sedwick Park depressions where the large tree stump was removed, as well as over the recent sinkhole repair, and in between. George is taking the lead on completing this project.
 - c. 2025 Budget adjustments: the Committee was reluctant to recommend reductions from recommendations presented to the

Board last month (which included about a \$20,000 budget increase compared with our 2024 budget.) It was recognized that some of the projected budget items could be paid for out of the Reserve Account instead of from additionally budgeted funds.

11. New Business

- a. Update Dam Emergency Action Plan: Steven will work on this State-mandated plan
- b. Rob pointed out concerns about people feeding ducks in our ponds, which is detrimental to their health and pond water quality. Rob will look into preparing an article about this for inclusion the Parkwood Press.
- c. Liz agreed to chair the Committee starting in December, with George to assist with taking minutes.

Parks and Lawns Meeting adjourned at 8:45.

Garden Committee - C. Classen

The October garden was looking pretty sparse. It is all about cleaning up plants that are done for the year and planting cool weather crops. Lettuce, Swiss chard, and beets have been planted so far. Unfortunately someone walked off with our container of seeds we had bought, collected from the seed catalog at the library, and saved from last year. Discouraging.

The garden sponsored a gourd painting event on 10/19 from 10-12 pm. There was a nice turnout of youngsters and their parents. It was a beautiful day and everyone had fun. A visitor to the garden said "I'm just visiting but your garden is charming! So welcoming!".

We are having a problem with critters eating our crops and have started to put up plant covers. It's probably squirrels. Our volunteer hours for October were 15.5.

Parkwood Area Lift Station Consolidation Project (PALSCO) Construction Has Begun

This City of Durham Department of Water Management (DWM) project, in the planning stages for years, is now underway. This entails replacement and expansion of the existing wastewater lift station (5729 Grandale Drive) that receives sewage from homes in the southern and western areas of Parkwood and surrounding homes in Newhall Village and along Kandes Court. Two smaller lift stations currently connected to it on Elmset Lane and in Newhall Village will be demolished and replaced by new gravity sewer mains (about 5000 feet). A new force main (3200 feet) will be installed from the new consolidated lift station in an easement within Parkwood Common area up to Sedwick Road and run eastward along the south side of Sedwick to connect to an existing manhole east of Revere that flows to the Triangle Wastewater Treatment Plant (west side of Hwy 55 at light for Alexander Road). Construction is projected to take over a year to complete.

Parkwood successfully negotiated with the City in the process of granting approval of easements needed for the project in Parkwood-owned common areas to assure that the project contractor concurrently removes a nuisance lagoon, debris, and other hazardous conditions associated with the original wastewater treatment plant located next to the lift station that was abandoned in 1978 when the lift station was first constructed.


